1. Course Description:

This course teaches students how to write university-level English essays and engage in academic research. Using selected readings, exercises, presentations, and writing assessments, students will improve their written communication skills throughout the term.

2. Required Texts:

- The Mad Scientist's Guide to Composition: A Somewhat Cheeky but Exceedingly Useful Introduction to Academic Writing by Jeffrey Andrew Weinstock (ISBN-13: 978-1554814459).¹
- Argumentative Essays: A Step-by-Step Guide (ISBN: 9781554815272 / 1554815274).²
- Selected readings on StudiUM and/or on reserve at the BLSH Library.

3. Assessments:

• In-class work and homework: 10%³

⁷This assessment includes participation in one individual meeting worth 2.5% and four essay preparation assignments worth 2.5% each (scaffolded grading is applied for this assessment).

- 10 April: Oral presentations on *Carmilla*, selected readings, writing workshops, essay preps 3 and 4 due, and final essay due
